
Synopsis

In this rigorous and entertaining essay, the reader can delve into the history of this artistic medium thanks to the excellent work Gerardo Vilches has done. Furthermore, the author gives us a complete and excellent list of the 100 Most Essential Works of the Ninth Art.


Biography
